With the British harvest having now finished, largely due to the lack of quality product available following the recent storms, the UK is now reliant on Spain/EU for its broccoli imports.

As Spain is only on its second week of supply, availability is still a challenge. However, we are seeing week on week improvements on product availability and, although the next week will be extremely difficult, these shortages should be relatively short-term.

We continue to work with our suppliers to obtain as much supply as we can, including speeding up deliveries from Spain.



There are some ongoing issues with lettuce, with the product continuing to struggle for weight.

Cos and Little Gem are still suffering from some damage that was caused by the high winds that were experienced across Spain and, while growers are working to remove the worst of the damage, they cannot remove it all, given the weight issues the product is also facing.

We are seeing some particular issues with 5kg iceberg and are currently using substitutions

Continental varieties are the most difficult with limited availability, although we hope to see some improvement either at the end of the week or early next. Unfortunately, supply will be challenging until then.



We are expecting Spanish supply to begin this week, quality dependent.

The Spanish crop is looking likely to be around 30% down on last year's levels. There are some issues with greening as a result of the hot weather and we expect this to be a challenge for the next month.

We anticipate sourcing supply from Egypt in January.

Early Spanish Satsumas are proving very difficult with greening and limited shelf life, so we are utilising other origins, particularly South African Nardacotts, until Clementines become available towards end of the month.



The continuing wet weather is a major challenge for growers, leading to quality and availability issues. As a result, we have some concessions in place for both size and some pepper spots, which will help to maximise availability.

We expect this week and potentially next week to be very difficult, depending on the weather conditions, but hope to see some improvement after that.



As a result of the current weather conditions, British Tenderstem crops are either finished or coming to an end. As Spanish product is not yet fully available, there are some short-term market

We are currently working with growers to mitigate the issue and identify additional supply from other origins both within the EU and from Africa. However, it is likely that the next couple of weeks will be challenging.



We expect the recent issues with tomatoes to continue for the next few weeks, as the Spanish crop is around three weeks late. The delay was caused by the extreme weather conditions that we saw over the summer, which led to late delivery of seeds and propagated plants to growers. This has particularly impacted vine, cherry vine, plum and beef tomatoes.

There are some specific issues with beef tomatoes, which take longer to grow. We are taking some final product from Holland and Belgium, but because of the weather conditions and stage in the season, these are smaller than normal, and we therefore have some size concessions in place to maximise availability.



past few weeks, including an early finish to the Peruvian harvest and delays in port loadings from South Africa, the market across Europe remains very short, particularly on small fruit.

However, the situation is improving and we expect it to return to normal later this week.



As we previously highlighted, quality and shelf life of the Northern Hemisphere pears are currently challenging.

It is not currently a major issue, but we are maintaining a watching brief as it could be a potential problem when we move to stored product in January.

There are still potatoes in the fields that have not

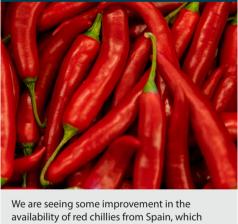


There are severe market shortages with strawberries, with UK and Dutch glasshouse stock already running low due to low light levels and unseasonal weather in September.

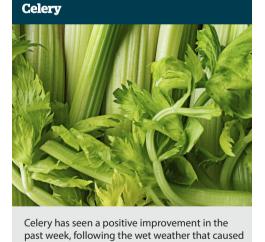
